



CASE STUDY

Why we got involved

- We have an established garden club in our school and this is its third
- The children thought it would be interesting and challenging to participate.
- It would give the children the opportunity to visit London.
- To give the children an opportunity to see professional gardens; something to aspire too.
- The children enjoy entering competitions.
- An opportunity for the children to represent county Durham at a national level.
- The children thought it would show that they care about the environment.
- The children have produced a good show of vegetables and flowers in previous years and they thought they could bring their skills to enhance

What we made for the Food and Farming zone

The children, with the help of a member of the community, made watering vessels out of recycled materials. Out of a lemonade bottle we made an attachment to fit on the end of a hose pipe and it works like a sprinkler. Using old plastic piping and a lemonade bottle we made a multi-water system that uses rainwater. We made a trickle watering system out of various-sized recycled water bottles, and we used washing-up-liquid bottles as watering vessels to water individual plants.

For other parts of the garden we made a gabion cage full of coal and old colliery bricks with a traditional proggie-style cushion made from plastic carrier bags on the top, plus a range of tree decorations using recycled materials.

What we learned

The children now understand that recycling can benefit the garden. Through this project they also learned many new skills including how to co-operate and work as a team, and how to work and chat in an informal manner about important issues. The project has encouraged children to work with people from a wider community and with a wide age range - the youngest being 7 years old and the oldest 81.
